Welcome note

Dear colleagues,

PheroFIP 19, the Joint Meeting of the IOBC/WPRS Working Groups “**Pheromones and other semiochemicals in integrated production**” and “**Integrated Protection of Fruit Crops**” (Subgroups Pome fruit arthropods and Stone fruits), will take place in **Lisbon** (Portugal), from **20 to 25 January 2019**. Forest Research Centre (CEF) together with Linking Landscape, Environment, Agriculture and Food Research Centre (LEAF), from the School of Agriculture (ISA), University of Lisbon will host the conference, in collaboration with Abreu Events, responsible for the technical secretariat.

The venue will take place in **Hotel Olisippo Oriente**, at Parque das Nações, a renovated area with modern architecture near Tagus river, in the eastern part of Lisbon, which was designed for hosting the last world fair of the 20th century, Expo 98. It is located not far from the airport, and about 25 minutes by metro from city center.

The theme of the conference will be “**Merging Pheromones and other semiochemicals with Integrated Fruit Production: current approaches and applications from research to field implementation in a changing environment**”. On the behalf of IOBC and the organization, we would like to invite you to come to Lisbon and actively participate, and share the results of your work. The conference aims at bringing together all involved in the study of Semiochemicals and Integrated Fruit Production, for presenting and discussing the latest research and technological advances that may contribute to find effective and sustainable solutions to deal with phytosanitary challenges under a changing environment. It will provide an opportunity for exchanging information and ideas, as well as strengthening common research and collaboration and stimulating new interactions, among participants.

English will be the official language of the meeting. Proceedings with all contributions, both oral and poster presentations will be published as full papers or extended abstracts in the IOBC wprs Bulletin.

Please post this circular and pass it to colleagues that may be interested in attending the conference.

Venue

The meeting will take place in **Hotel Olissippo Oriente**, at Parque das Nações, Lisbon. Located near Tagus river, in the eastern part of Lisbon, not far from the airport, **Parque das Nações** used to be an ugly industrial area until it was chosen as the site to host the last world fair of the 20th century, Expo 98. It has since been reborn into a futuristic area, home to some wonderful examples of modern architecture. One of them is *Oriente Station*, a landmark with the signature of Santiago Calatrava, while Pritzker-award winning architect Alvaro Siza Vieira is the man behind the fantastic and futuristic *Pavilhão de Portugal*. Many of the other constructions have an ocean theme (the twin towers São Gabriel and São Rafael resemble ships and are named after two of Vasco da Gama's vessels), and there is also one of the world's most spectacular aquariums nearby, *Oceanário*. Everywhere you turn is a glimpse of the river looking like an ocean crossed by Europe's longest bridge (*Vasco da Gama Bridge*), water volcanos erupting, wave-shaped benches. Parque das Nações is a side of Lisbon contrasting with its old historic center.

How to submit a manuscript

The presented scientific contributions will be published as conference proceedings in the IOBC-WPRS Bulletin and delivered on the website of IOBC-WPRS. Authors should prepare their manuscripts following IOBC guidelines (see **instructions below**). In order to allow good and uniform reproduction, all manuscripts must be submitted in **MS Word**. To facilitate the preparation of manuscripts a template can be downloaded from https://www.iobc-wprs.org/pub/bulletins/IOBC-WPRS_bulletin_manuscript_template.docx.



Language: The papers should be written in English. The content should be clear, concise, and has been revised by a native or experienced English speaker.

Type of manuscripts

- **Extended abstracts:** authors should submit an extended abstract (maximal 2 pages), both for poster and oral presentations
- **Full papers:** maximal 4 pages (preferred)

Deadlines

- **Extended abstracts:** should be submitted **before 30th September 2018**.
- **Full papers:** should be submitted **before 30th March 2019**.

Instructions: full paper

The papers should consist of:

- Abstract
- Key words
- Introduction
- Material and methods
- Results and discussion (separated or combined)
- Acknowledgements (if necessary)
- References

Instructions for the papers:

1. Paper-format: A4
2. Left and right margins of the text: 2.5 cm
Upper margin: 3.0 cm
Lower margin: 2.5 cm
This results in a printing area of 16 cm x 23.7 cm
3. Line spacing: 1
4. Font: “Times New Roman” or “Times”
5. All titles and subtitles should be flush left
6. Font of the title: 15 pt, bold



7. Font of the abstract: 11 pt
8. Font of subtitles (sections): 13 pt, bold
9. Font of the running text: 12 pt (except titles and abstract)
10. No hyphenation in the text
11. Justification of the text
12. Make sure that the first lines of all paragraphs (except for the paragraph that follows a title) are indented with a [Tab] command (0.8 cm). Do not use spaces instead of tabs and indents. Do not repeatedly use Standard-Tab stops
13. Scientific names of plants and animals in Italics
14. The authors’ names should be typed in the normal font (not in capitals or any other face, not bold) in the text as well as in the “References”
15. Layout as shown in the template
16. Do not number the pages; the page numbering is done when the bulletins are being compiled

Tables & figures

1. Incorporate tables and figures into the manuscript. Make sure that they are not linked to a file on your own computer, which makes them disappear in the manuscript when it is sent away
2. Two free lines have to precede and follow each figure or table
3. Make your tables with the [Table]-function. Do not use repeated [Standard]-Tab’s or spaces
Legends should be mentioned above the tables and under the figures. In the figures and tables the smallest font should be 10 pt. Smaller fonts may become unreadable
Tables and figures should be centered
4. To differentiate between parts of a diagram or between curves in a figure, use clearly different colours or shading in different patterns. Make sure that the patterns as well can be clearly discerned from each other.
Please avoid in the figures large uniform black or grey areas, fill out the columns in a figure with a pattern or a colour
5. Coloured photographs are welcome, but they shouldn’t require too much memory capacity (not more than 1 MB each)
The figures, too, should not require too much memory capacity.
6. If they need more than 1 MB, they will often have to be downsized which may be followed by a lack of quality

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If you cite authors in the text, please order them according to the date of publication, first dates first, e.g. (Erwin & Ribeiro, 1996; Kuldau & Yates, 2000; McCracken et al., 2003), or “... Erwin & Ribeiro (1996) and McCracken et al. (2003) have shown...”

The references are written in Times Roman 12 pt with hanging indents by 0.8 cm in the first line. References are listed alphabetically. In the case of several references by the same author, give single-author references first, e.g. Smith (1996) before Smith et al. (1994), but Smith (1993) before Smith (1994). Please follow the examples given below for journal articles, book chapters and entire books and the examples in the bulletin manuscript.

For extended abstracts (max 2 pages), follow the instructions for manuscripts:

1. Paper-format: A4
2. Left and right margins of the text: 2.5 cm
Upper margin: 3.0 cm
Lower margin: 2.5 cm
This results in a printing area of 16 cm x 23.7 cm
3. Line spacing: 1
4. Font: “Times New Roman” or “Times”
5. Font of the extended abstract, key words etc.: 12 pt
6. Font of the title: 16 pt, bold
7. Font of subtitles (References, key words, acknowledgements...): 14 pt, bold
8. No hyphenation in the text
9. Justification of the text
10. Make sure that the first lines of all paragraphs (except for the paragraph that follows a title) are indented with a [Tab] command (0.8 cm). Do not use spaces instead of tabs and indents. Do not repeatedly use Standard-Tab stops
11. Scientific names of plants and animals in Italics
12. The authors’ names should be typed in the normal font (not in capitals or any other face, not bold) in the text as well as in the “References” (if appearing in the abstract)
13. If references are mentioned in the extended abstract, they must be listed under “References”
14. Key words should be mentioned, in a distance of 2 lines to the text

Acceptation of manuscript

The organizing committee will review the abstracts and notify the authors once the presentation form (oral/poster) has been determined.

Registration

The presenting author must be a registered participant. Please note that the presenting author is not automatically registered by submitting an abstract. Regular registration is obligatory and binding and implies payment of the registration fee.
